Claymore ETFs offer investors access to both traditional and alternative energy investments.

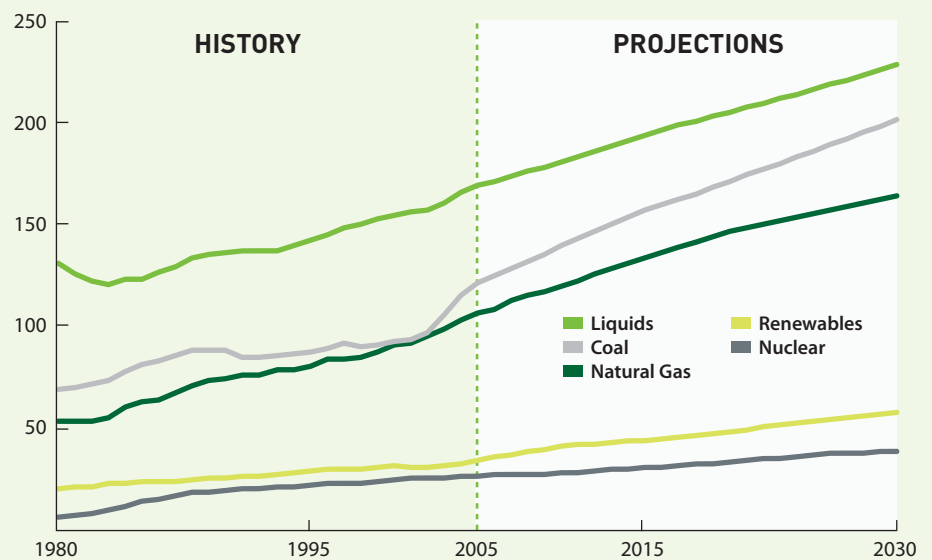
- 1** Solar power is emerging as one of the most exciting opportunities within the alternative space with favorable public policy, rising venture capital inflows, falling prices and limited ecological effects. The photovoltaic cell, a fundamental technology in the solar energy industry, is currently the fastest-growing kind of alternative energy, increasing by 50% a year.¹ The Claymore/MAC Global Solar Energy Index ETF (TAN) is the first solar ETF available to investors.
- 2** Traditional energy may be a well-established industry, but it still has the potential for continued growth. Canada holds the world's second largest proven oil reserves (after Saudi Arabia) and remains the largest trading partner with the United States. Canadian Association of Petroleum Producers estimate Canadian crude oil production to continue its current growth, with significant yields from the oil sands of the Alberta province.² As the first U.S.-listed Canadian energy ETF, Claymore/SWM Canadian Energy Income Index ETF (ENY) offers investors exposure to this developing energy market.

Traditional vs. Alternative Energy

In recent years, alternatives to traditional fossil fuels (such as solar, biofuels, wind, waves and others) have commanded greater attention as environmental concerns have moved into the mainstream. Investment dollars are flowing into research for these alternatives, spurring innovation and lowering costs. Yet traditional energy sources still fuel a major share of the world's energy consumption and their dominance is expected to continue over the next several decades. Investors may have an opportunity to gain exposure to the energy sector's dynamics through both alternative and traditional fuels.

The alternative energy industry can be significantly affected by a variety of fundamental, competitive, regulatory, economic, and supply/demand factors. The solar energy industry has experienced an industry-wide shortage of polysilicon, which may place constraints on the revenue growth or productivity of solar energy companies. Solar energy companies may not be able to secure adequate and cost-effective supply of solar wafers, cells or reclaimable silicon. A lack or delay of widespread adoption or sufficient demand, changes to government subsidies, economic incentives or regulations and policies may present technical, regulatory or economic barriers to the purchase or use of solar power products thus reducing demand or causing corresponding declines in the revenues and profits of solar energy companies.
